Biography

Of The Late Mr. Samuel Kwame Addo



r. Samuel Kwame Addo was born in Akyem Asafo, 85 years ago to Mr. Stephen Yaw Addo and Maame Ama Dapaah. Until his departure, Mr. S.K. Addo was married to Madam Victoria Addo for fifty-one years.

He started school at Akyem Asafo Presbyterian school of Ghana. When his father passed on, he was taken to his mother at Akyem Maase, where he attended the Maase Methodist School and then to Nsawam. He successfully wrote and passed the Common Entrance Examination and gained admission to Mfantsipim School, Cape Coast. Infact, he was a bright young boy, who never downplayed education.

After completing his Secondary education, he gained admission to

the Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology, Kumasi and thereafter, he went to the University of Ghana to study Business Administration, Accounting Option.

He later on worked as an Accountant at the Cocoa Marketing Board for some years. Thereafter he started his personal business - Safari Trading Company, Adabraka right opposite GNTC Motors - Adjabeng.

At the peak of his business success, he ran businesses ranging from sale of vehicles, imports and exports of goods, farming (particularly oil palm plantation) and the creative art industry of music (Safari Sounds). He sometimes made his bandstand play to support some social functions. He ran the multi business in order to find a perfect fit for his income stream – stretching himself beyond his

comfort zone.

At the end, it all paid-off well for him and he made a consistent stream of income as a young man, operating under the business name, Safari Trading company. He was calm and gentle, articulate and smart, the paragon of an ideal gentleman. To his wider family, he remained a pillar of support extending his kindness to all. He was a family man, sacrificing personal comfort most times, for the good and development of the family. He was an example of commitment, conscientiousness and hard work. He was a very organized person, who exuded and demanded excellence in equal measure from his children. If he asked you to undertake a task, he expected you to do so, to the best of your ability and his expectation. He had a positive influence on the lives of so many people by his selfless and countless acts of kindness, always giving and never expecting any favours back.

Mr. S. K. Addo has served his due. He was a husband, father, brother as well and a friend to many, until his departure. Even though we are saddened by his departure, we take our solace in God and in His word of assurance in such times.

e met and got married when I was 18. I have lots of memories but I will like to keep it Simple, Short and Sweet. My husband, affectionately called me "SISI". His friends called him "S.K.", or "Mr. Addo"; family members and relatives called him "Kwame Addo" and one particular friend Mr. Adjei (a.k.a Shappirro) called him "Battalion" because we had a lot of children.

My husband was a people person and also a lover of pets (dogs like Scooby, Baby Champ and Bob, cats, rabbits, monkeys, parrots not forgetting the sheep and goats (the boys were responsible to send them for grazing).

He loved his family and as a father he was a generous provider, teaching his children to emulate that fine example-by leaving allowances for their younger siblings when it was time to go to Secondary school.


