Biography & Tributes In Memory of the Late

GLORIA Aku AYE-ADDO

20th February 1920 - 22nd February 2020

Gloria Afua Aku 'Sika' Aye-Addo (nee Newman), popularly called "Gola".

We celebrate your life for who you were. You were a "CENTENARIAN" not because of what you did or what you had, but because of who and what your maker had proposed for you to be. Glory be to God.

Gloria was born on 20th February 1920 at Akropong, Akwapim in the Eastern Region of Ghana. Her father was Oheneba Kwabena Opare Newman, (the first born son of Omanhene Addo Dankwa II of Akwapim, and Aku "Sika" Otopah from Akropong "Banmu"). Her mother, Mrs. Emelia Abena Otomo Newman hailed from Larteh Akwapim in the Eastern Region, all of whom have gone to glory.

Baby Gloria, was born on 20th February, 1920. The year 1920 was remarkable and very eventful. A time that women's uprising for the right to vote dominated parts of the World, whiles the ending of the 1919 influenza was in site. A time that the then Gold Coast, under the governorship of Sir Gordon Guggisburg was experiencing social and economic changes to the benefit of the citizens of Ghana, with both Mission and Public schools increase at site. A time when tradition and culture were held in high esteem. Having been born a royal, Gloria grew up in the dynamics of traditional and cultural upbringing from her parents and grand parents. Her grand father Nana Addo Dankwa II (known in private life as Mr. Nicholas Opare Newman), who was a teacher by profession before taking the throne as paramount chief did not relent in giving his grand daughter the deserving formal education. The young girl Aku, the last born child of four siblings was therefore opportuned to having formal education at a Mission school even as a girl. In the course time, her name Gloria was affectionately dubbed "Gola" by the other nieces and nephews, who could not pronounce the name Gloria very well.

Aku started her formal education at the Akropong Presbyterian Primary school. It was during this period that tragedy struck. Her father, Oheneba Opare Newman lost his battle with a short illness and passed. Aku's mother and her children moved from Akropong to her hometown Larteh, where she continued her schooling. She excelled in every area of her elementary education and was among the few girls who were selected to continue their Middle school education in a girls institution at the Krobo Odumasi Girls School, in the Greater Accra Region of Ghana, after their elementary education.

After her first two children, Matilda Otwiwa Newman, who lies in state presently, and former Sergeant Kwadwo Yirenkyi of blessed memory, Gloria's mother deemed it necessary for her to continue her education. After her middle school education she attended a vocational school to become a seamstress. Aku's daughter was then raised by her older sister, Mrs Doris Acheampong, until she was ready to resume her parental duties. We honor our affectionate Auntie Abena Gyamea, (Mea), of blessed memory on this day as we say good bye to our mother.

Whiles practicing her vocation at Asamankese, Gloria Aku Sika Newman met and married the love of her life, Mr. Martin Glover Aye-Addo I, from Obosomase, in the Eastern Region. Gloria and her husband Martin were a couple, one dear to the other. The couple relocated to Kumasi, in the Ashanti Region, where her husband continued to pursue his carrier in the Ghana Police Force. She was very supportive of her dear husband in the upbringing of their six other children: Ben, William, Theresa, Andrew, Mavis (Mamaa), and Charles. They lived at North Suntreso in Kumasi most of their adult lives. Gola wore many hats in her North Suntresu neighborhood. The couple were members of the neighborhood ballroom dancing club. She created the slogan, ("slow, quick, quick, slow.) which was derived from the quick step dance she loved so much, for the

club. She was a great dancer. Not an athlete, but walking was one of her best things to do. Gola's patriotism to her nation Ghana (Gold Coast at that time), was exhibited through her support of the Convention People's Party (CPP), one of the leading political parties which was led by the late Osagyefo Dr. Kwame Nkrumah from 1949 to usher Ghana form Colonial rule to Independence. As staunch members of the Convention's People's Party, Gloria was very supportive of her husband who was the chairman of the neighborhood CPP affiliates. She held the position of a propaganda secretary for the women's branch of the party at North Suntreso, Kumasi. She never relented in her duties. Even though it was a period of time with little technology available to the people, Gloria used the gong gong, like a neighborhood 'crier', through the streets of North Suntresu to summon all the CPP women to meetings. She diligently, like every position she held in her lifetime, delivered her duties with grace.

Throughout her life this vibrant, enthusiastic young women never gave up her faith. Whiles in Kumasi she became a regular member of the Ramseyer Presbyterian Church at Adum, under the renowned Basel (Switzerland) Pastor and Missionary - Reverend Peyer, and later transferred to the Bantama Presbyterian church, which was closer to North Suntreso. With fellow Christians in the neighborhood they organized daily morning prayers which started in the wee hours of the morning in the corridor of the Red Cross center at

North Suntresu. She gave her best to the work of God. Gloria diligently served as a chorister, singing band member and an Usher in the house of God. She was a faithful member of the women's fellowship and took many lead roles in the women's fellowship's biblical performances at the Adum Presbyterian church. Her favorite Easter performance was when she played a role in which she had to sing the song below. This song was one of her favorite songs she would sing all the time, especially during Good Friday.

> "Were you there, when they crucified my Lord; Were you there, when they crucified my Lord. Oh! Oh! Oh! Oh! Oh!Sometimes it causes me to tremble, tremble, tremble; Were you there, when they crucified my Lord."

She was a loving and serviceable mother to all irrespective of who you were or your place of origin. She was the eye of her extended family. Her great counsel, guidance, support and love was not limited to her biological children. She set many educational and useful future goals for family members and house helps, who she encountered throughout her adult life. She instilled God's love into her children and all the people she was acquainted with everywhere she went.

In later life, she was publicly referred to as Auntie Aku. She was never idle. She engaged in several commercial activities including the sales of African cloth and "provisions". She later resorted to selling Pottery, a trade which involved traveling to many local factories, at Mangoase, Jumapo, and the Kwahu

metropolitan areas, in the Eastern Region, where the purchases were made. She was very successful in this trade. She became well known and was loved for her kindness and readiness to help with diligence.

In 1962, she and her husband started a cocoa farm at Antwi Agyeikrom in the Nkawie District of the Ashanti Region. She quickly adapted to the farm and the surroundings of a village life and struggled to make the cocoa farm a huge success. Everyone in the village took a liking to Gola. And this nickname reverberated throughout the village and beyond. Auntie "Dora", as some of the villagers could call her name, never forgot her maker. She joined and worshipped with the Methodist congregation which was the prominent denomination in the village. With permission from the then caretaker of the church she started a Presbyterian congregation with a handful of Presbyterians in the village. With this dedication to God her last born child, Charles, with whom she settled on and off at the village is now a Reverend Minister and holds a PhD in Christology. Glory be to God.

During their retirement years Gloria stayed on and off at the village and North Suntreso until she became a widow in 1986, after 42 years of marriage. In 1989, three years after the passing of her husband, Martin Glover Aye-Addo, she migrated to the United States of America where she lived in the State of Maryland with her family for seven years. During this period she worshipped at a Pentecostal church with her family. She dedicated her time to more studies of the word of God under the teachings of Reverend K. O. Gyimah, the then assistant pastor of the church of the Living God in Hyattsville Maryland, after which she re-dedicated her life to God. It was a very glorious and personal decision she made which brought more fulfillment to her

Christian life, she later acknowledged. Once again she joined and supported a group of Presbyterian

worshipers who had started a new denomination in Virginia in the USA. Today that small congregation has birthed 3 more congregations in the States.

Mama Newman, as they affectionately called her, was a mother, counselor, a teacher and friend to all, especially to the members of the Okuapeman Association of the Washington metropolitan area. She travelled far and wide with the members of the association to cities and towns in the United States of America - her favorite place of visit being Atlantic City in New Jersey. She worked with, and for, many of the mothers in our African communities in Maryland. She returned to Ghana, her home country in 1996, with two of her grand children, Elvin and Yolanda. Gola settled with her children and also in her hometown, Akropong Akuapim, where she became the "abrewatia" of the Banmu Royal Family.

On the 22nd day of February, two days after reaching the 100 year's milestone, becoming a centenarian, Mrs. Gloria Aku Sika Aye-Addo, was peacefully called to glory. Obaapayin Mrs Gloria Aku "Sika" Aye-Addo is survived by six of her eight children. The other two have passed on, one of whom, the oldest, Matilda Otwiwa Newman, lies in state with her presently. She left behind many grand children, great-grand children and great- grandchildren, and we dedicate to her one of her favourite Scriptures.

We did not call her Mother, Mom, Mama or Maa. All we knew was Gola! The affectionate name her oldest baby girl, Matilda spoke as she struggled to say "Gloria" became our mother's nick name and the affectionate name to us and the world she lived in the rest of her life.

Gola, the news of your passing on 22 February 2020, two days after celebrating your 100th birthday was a big blow to us. Life indeed is short. Even after being with us for so long we still feel it is so soon. We have lost our mum, our friend and counsellor. This is indeed a sobering day for us. Life indeed "is a walking shadow...., which sooner than later "is heard no more". The Oak of the family has indeed been uprooted. And this is a great loss for us.

Gola, we shall miss your humble, attitude, your sarcasms, your joviality, your attention to detail and respect for customs and traditions. Your belief in God, always covering your children with your petition to God, reciting bible passages to us with your favorite passage in the Scriptures: "O give thanks to the Lord, for He is good! For His mercy endures forever".- (Psalm 136:1) NKJV., will forever reverberate through our minds. You taught us to use our hands for everything. You taught us that cleanliness is next to Godliness and that we should always ensure that our home is clean and our hearts are likewise. You taught us to live a very simple lifestyle and be friendly with and accept all persons You loved your nephews and nieces just like your own children and never distinguished between them. You gave us a deep sense of family values and taught us to respect and preserve family traditions and customs. In good times and bad times we did not want because you rose to the occasion in every situation to the best of your God given abilities.

You have shown us how to live our lives and to steer the lives of our children in a Godly manner and when

you are not with us anymore. You created your own songs and danced to our many educational achievements and and even our failures which encouraged us to do better and persevered through our young lives. One of such songs goes; "se m'nwu ntem ahh, medide ansa na mewu".

Our fondest memory of you will ever be the statement of 80 year old "Agya Danger" and his wife 75 year old "Maame Sikadoo" at Antwi Agyeikrom, when Agya Danger told Mama Sikadoo to die first so that his family can't remove her from the matrimonial home. This happened in the days when there was no Law 111, when Maame Sikaddo confronted Agya Danger that she was toiling to serve him for nothing, because after his death his family will throw her out of the house they had built. This case was brought before you by Abrewa Sikadoo to judge. You looked straight at her and responded, "this case will be taken to the court of law if it happens". The old Maame Sikadoo was stunned at the mention of the word "court" and said, "Monhwe Obaa anim a ode beko court!" Oh! Gola you will forever be missed! Even the old deemed you wise to judge their case. We are greatly and forever honored.

Though we celebrate your life, we are saddened by our loss of never having you with us physicallyagain. We are thankful to God for the long and happy life that He gave you. We are thankful to Him for the wisdom He gave you which you also imparted to us and to the next generation. We are thankful to Him for giving you a peaceful rest such that even at your passing you were still smiling. We thank you for your wise counselling, your shinning examples, and all the necessary words of caution that you gave us. We shall forever remain true to them.

BIOGRAPHY OF THE LATE MATILDA OTWIWA NEWMAN

Matilda Otwiwa Newman, ("Ceedear") was born on 18th April 1936 to Gloria Aku Newman of Akropong. Gloria Aku was the grand daughter of Nana Addo Dankwa II, the Omanhene of Akwapim and Obaapayin Mary Aku Otopah of Banmu, at Akropong Akwapim. Her father was a native of Larteh Akwapim in the Eastern Region. Matilda was at birth one of a kind - beautiful, bouncing, lovely and adoring.

Her grandmother, Mama Otomo Newman, could not help with such a God given baby and therefore, called her only granddaughter by the name "My Baby Dear". "Baby Dear" was later changed to Sister Dear and then to Cece Dear. As Ceedear's mother, Gloria, was ushered into continuing her education, Babydear ended up in the care of her senior Auntie Mrs. Doris Acheampong and her husband Papa Acheampong, both of Blessed memory. The couple became the guardian of Matilda throughout her elementary education. We salute them for the love and the good upbringing of their lovely niece.

In later years, the young Matilda moved and lived with her biological mother at Kumasi in the Ashanti Region. She successfully completed and obtained her middle school leaving Certificate at the Bantama Presbyterian Middle School.

Her second marriage was to Captain Frempong (later Major Frempong), of Mpraeso in the Kwahu district. She had two children with Captain Frempong namely, Ivy and Yvonne. The couple and their two children were transferred to Tamale where they spent some time and returned to Accra before her husband retired from the Ghana Armed Forces.

While living in Accra, Matilda was the go to representative of the family. She was a woman with a very warm

heart whose house was open to all. She gracefully executed all family responsibilities and and worked hard in any profession she embarked on.

"CeeDear" as she was popular called, was a leading staff of the Atico Cosmetics Manufacturing Company at Bubiashie where she worked closely with the CEO, Mr. Atiemo. Those were the days when the slogan, "Atico here, Atico there, Atico everywhere", reverberated throughout Ghana. Her work ethics were second to none. She worked with Atico for close to 15 years, after which she established her own powder and pomade company, "Baby Ivy", at Adabraka in the Greater Accra Region.

Matilda was a staunch member of the Presbyterian church of Ghana, Kanda branch. She dedicated her services in the house of God as a member of the Kanda Women's Fellowship to champion the work of the ministry of God.

In her last years she settled at Abeka La Paz where she was taken ill and was called to glory by her Maker. Matilda is survived by four of her five children, grand children and great grand children.
