

DR. MARK STEPHEN YAW OWIREDU

Biography



Most of you here present may have witnessed or experienced Mark's humility. For those who never encountered him, sorry, but you have missed. As a family, we experienced it the most. We thank God for having this gentleman as a member of the family. Where Mark's strengths could not go, his humility and intelligence took him. He was a true embodiment of integrity and humility.

On September 7, 1957, a baby boy was born to Mr. Jordan Smith Owiredu and Madam Paulina Oforiwaa both of blessed memory. This boy was to be christened Mark Stephen Owiredu whom we all affectionately called Bro. Mark in the family. He was the third of six siblings.

Mark Owiredu attended the renowned Anum Presbyterian Senior Boys' School, in Form 2, under a very difficult learning environment, the smart Mark took and successfully passed the Common Entrance Examination, gaining admission to Anum Secondary School (1972 - 1976), where he completed the Ordinary Level education. He then went on to complete his Advanced Level at Winneba Secondary School (1976 -1978). In relentless pursuit of his ambitions, Mark progressed further in his education and obtained a Bachelor of Pharmacy degree from KNUST in 1982.

Mark became an intern at the then GIHOC Pharmaceuticals after graduating. Not wanting to lose a gem in the making, the company subsequently employed the young Mr. Owiredu upon the completion of the internship program. His hard work and brilliance as a Pharmacist, paid off once again, as Mark was sponsored by the company to have a stint with a renowned German Pharmaceutical company, Sun Pharmaceutical GmbH, not only to broaden his scope in the pharmaceutical landscape but also to create valuable networks within the industry, some of which he still counted on till his untimely death.

For close to 38 years, Mark never relented in his dedication and service to the pharmaceutical industry in Ghana. the evidence of which has been eloquently written by those of you who knew him in his professional life. His work and contribution to this industry, cuts across the public and private sectors to regulatory, policy-making, and advisory roles. His service towards the development of the pharmaceutical industry in Ghana included working with GIHOC Pharmaceuticals, DANAFCO, Meecham Chemist, Phyto-Riker, Kinapharma and finally at Ernest Chemist Limited where he delivered his services as the General Manager, until his sudden demise in the early hours of that fateful day, Tuesday, June 2, 2020.

He was a Fellow of the Ghana College of Pharmacists and was appointed as a member of the School of Pharmacy Management Committee by the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Ghana from 2017 until his passing. Mark was also served as a member of the first Technical Advisory Committee on Safety of Medicines at the Food and Drugs Administration (FDA) from 2005 to 2016.



Your love, devotion, forgiving heart and selflessness were values we could never forget, and can only hope to imitate.


Sitting outdoors together, chatting about current events, your advice, your laughter and even your sarcastic rebuke are the little things we will never forget and will forever miss.

He persistently dissolved and diffused tensions and also lifted us up with his unique sense of humuor.

On Monday, 1st June, 2020 he reported to work as usual. We had our formal and for some of us informal discussions and the usual 1pm to 2pm lunchtime jokes, debates and arguments with him. He left the office at about 7pm which was typical of him even at his age and position. There was no sign or indication of sickness, tiredness or distress around him at the time he retired for home.

On Tuesday, he had set up a management meeting, circulated agenda for the meeting and posted a last minute Whatsapp message telling us about his expectations for the discussions. This meeting could not come off as scheduled, instead we were terribly hit with the devastating news of his demise. The entire factory was engulfed with shock, disbelief, dejection, confusion, wailing, lamentations and uncoordinated behaviours.

Mr. Owiredu, GM, MSO; your death has made us "orphans", your sudden departure has turned us into an army without the usual commander and a flock without a shepherd. You saved many lives through your profession only to lose yours at this unfortunate moment, why?

There are wounds that never show on the body which are deeper and more hurtful than anything that bleeds. This is the level of pain in our hearts.

GM, Why have you left us mid-stream when we have so much unfinished business?

MSO, At least you could have waited to witness and participate in the commissioning of our EU-GMP factory at Klagon before leaving us, right?

Death indeed is not only inevitable but very wicked. Maybe as it is said; "sometimes our lives have to be completely shaken up, changed and re-arranged to relocate us to the place where we are meant to be". Could this be the reason? You have gone, but we know that your presence in other dimensions is palpably with us as individuals, as a company and as a nation. May the Lord cause your good works to follow you till we meet again. You shall forever remain in our hearts.

MSO, Rest in Peace GM, Da yie. Amen.

On occasions like this when pharmacists congregate to pay our last respects to a departed colleague, especially one of the stature of Pharm. Mark Stephen Owiredu, we console ourselves with these words:

"Death is not extinguishing the light; it is only putting out the lamp because the dawn has come".

The Pharmaceutical Society of Ghana (PSGH) received the news of the sudden passing away of Pharm. Mark Stephen Owiredu with utter disbelief on that fateful Tuesday, 2nd June, 2020. His passing away was a shock to the pharmacy fraternity.

As a matter of fact, he had just participated in a virtual preceptor training organized by the Ghana College of Pharmacists the week before where he as usual made very valuable contributions to the importance of preceptorship in the training of specialist and consultant pharmacists. His last input was on the need to focus on the 70-20-10 formula as we train specialist and consultant pharmacists. The 70-20-10 formula or was developed by Morgan McCall, Robert Eichinger and Michael Lombardo at the Center for Creative Leadership in North Carolina, USA. This formula proposes that on average, 70% of a person's learning at work is internal and experience-based, 20% comes from interacting with fellow employees and 10% is the result of formal training and reading. This was the important lesson Pharm. Owiredu left for us prior to his sudden departure to be with his Maker. Pharm. Mark Stephen Owiredu was admitted to Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology (KNUST) to pursue Bachelor of Pharmacy (Honours) in 1979. He was admitted to the University Hall popularly known as Katanga. He was thus a Kantangee and a Fellow.

At the Faculty of Pharmacy, he combined his academic activities very well with general student activities. He participated in all Ghana Pharmaceutical Students' Association activities including Drug Safety Campaigns and Health Promotion activities. He held the position of General Secretary of the GPSA whilst at the KNUST. Due to the aluta by university students, he and his year group went through the compact programme and graduated in 1982.

Pharm. Mark Stephen Owiredu was very much interested in local production of pharmaceuticals and it was no wonder he chose to undertake his one year mandatory internship at GIHOC Pharmaceuticals (now Phytoriker). After completion of the internship, he wrote and passed the Ghana Pharmacy Professional Qualifying Examination (GPPQE) and became a registered member of the Pharmaceutical Society of Ghana (PSGH). His assigned registration number by the Pharmacy Council was PA 808. Because of his dedication and passion for the pharmaceutical industry and local manufacture of pharmaceuticals, he was employed by GIHOC Pharmaceuticals after completing the internship. He pursued his ambition to learn, improve and help develop the local pharmaceutical industry, and so became one of the experts in the pharmaceutical industry.

He undertook further practical training in Pharmaceutical formulation and manufacturing in Germany while he was at GIHOC Pharmaceuticals.

Pharm. Mark Owiredu's expertise made him a household name amongst industrial pharmacists and he was sought after by many pharmaceutical manufacturers. He has at one point in time or the other assisted most pharmaceutical manufacturing companies in Ghana with his expertise and competence.

These include Kinapharma and Dannex Pharmaceuticals among others.

Pharm. Mark Owiredu put his knowledge, competence and expertise at the disposal of the PSGH. He was always a resource person at AGMs, programmes and activities on pharmaceutical manufacturing and was very actively involved in the activities of Industrial Pharmacists Association of the PSGH. He was instrumental in developing the PSGH Strategic Plan which included a pillar and sections on developing local pharmaceutical manufacturing. Prior to his demise, he was the General Manager of Ernest Chemists pharmaceutical manufacturing plant in Tema where he mentored and raised many pharmacists and employees to develop skills and competences in pharmaceutical manufacturing.

The PSGH has indeed lost an illustrious member.


His students have benefited immensely from his advice and direction while they were going through their research in partial fulfillment for the award of Membership or Fellowship of the College.

The late Mark Stephen Yaw Owiredu was a kind hearted, humble, extremely patient and above all a very generous man who would not hesitate a second to help those in need. His generosity knew no boundaries and so many people at both the work place and home have benefited from him. He was one of the pioneers in the pharmaceutical manufacturing industry in Ghana.

He graduated from the then University of Science and Technology, Kumasi in July,1982 and joined the then GIHOC Pharmaceuticals Itd in October, 1982 as a national service personnel. By deed of hard work and intelligence, he was employed permanently by management of GIHOC Pharmaceuticals Ltd in 1983 after his national service. Mark rose through the ranks and became the production manager, oral solid dosage forms. During his tenure of office, Mark took the opportunity to pursue Post Graduate Diploma in Industrial Management at U.S.T, Kumasi.

In 1990, when the German government decided to put up a new and modern manufacturing plant for GIHOC Pharmaceuticals, Mark was among the team of staff who were trained outside Ghana with Fresenius AG, Bad Homburg and Wiemer Pharma, Rastat in Germany to build capacity to operate the new plant which was then under construction. He was the consultant who helped in the establishment of Meacham Manufacturing Company in the latter part of 1994. He did production test-run for Meacham in December 1994 with some of his experienced machine operators from GIHOC Pharmaceuticals limited namely Enoch Tetteh and the late Edmund Akusikaro of blessed memory. At Meacham, he worked on part-time basis in the evenings to Mr. Samuel Asante-Boateng (now with the Food and Drugs Authority) who was then the full-time production pharmacist.

In 1996 when GIHOC Pharmaceuticals Itd was divested to an American company known as Phyto-Riker, Mr. Owiredu left to assist the management of the then DANAF-CO Ltd to set up their own pharmaceutical manufacturing unit at Taifa in Accra. He served as the General Production Manager for DANAFCO from 1996 to 1999. At DANAF-CO, he single handedly trained Mr. Yaw Nyarko Sefah (Now production manager with Ernest Chemist) to better understand pharmaceutical manufacturing. Alongside working at Danafco, Mark Owiredu worked privately as a consultant in the establishment of the manufacturing wing of Kinapharma Ltd in 1998 and later took up a contract term for two years as a factory manager from October 1999 to September 2001. During this period, he worked together with Mr. Dhanajay Tripathi (now CEO of Pharmanova Ltd) to help the company to manufacture a wide range of pharmaceutical products in the following dosage forms; oral tablets, capsules, powders, sachets and liquids. Together with the CEO of Kinapharma Ltd, Mr. Kofi Nsiah-Poku, who is also a pharmacist by profession, came up with the famous product "Akoma APC" which is still a household name in the whole country.

Mark Owiredu did not end his ambition to grow the pharmaceutical manufacturing industry in Ghana when he left Kinapharma ltd. In fact, when Mr. Ernest Bediako Sampong,

a pharmacist and the CEO of Ernest Chemists Ltd decided to go into pharmaceutical manufacturing, there was no better person to help him achieve his dream than Mark Owiredu. He was thus engaged by Ernest Chemist Limited (ECL) as a consultant to help the company establish its own manufacturing unit in Tema. Together with a team of architects and engineers they set to build ECL's first manufacturing plant.

It therefore came as no surprise when the management of ECL convinced Mark to stay on as the first Production Manager of the factory in November, 2001. He later became the Deputy General Manager of the company and finally, the General Manager, a position he held until his sudden demise.

In November 2005, Mark was invited by the Food and Drugs Authority (FDA) to serve on the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) on Safety of medicines until February, 2016. The FDA benefited immensely from his expertise as an industrial pharmacist and quality control expert on the committee.

Until his demise, Mark was also a visiting lecturer at the West African Post Graduate College of Pharmacist, where he was teaching students with the interest in working in the Pharmaceutical Manufacturing Industry.

For the past nineteen years Mark Stephen Owiredu has been with ECL where he has helped build a solid team in pharmaceutical manufacturing. Through his leadership ECL locally produced pharmaceuticals which have become household brands. His technical ability in his chosen career and his devotion to duty was par excellence. His footprints are dotted all over the pharmaceutical industry in Ghana. Mark had the Midas touch that affected the lives of both individuals and companies in the country.

Mark Stephen Owiredu was a very energetic person who was devoted to his work and always left the office late to clear is desk.

As the years went by one thought he will slow down but this was not to be. To those of us close to him, he was a very healthy person who was always regular and punctual at work. 




