



The late Rev Dr. Kobena Charm, affectionately known to many as "Kobby" or "Pastor Charm" was born in Sekondi on December 8, 1959, to Daniel Ofori Charm and Janet Aba Woode (all of blessed memory). He was the second of 8 siblings.

He started his primary education in 1964 at Nana Anaisie Memorial School now Adiembra Secondary School. Shortly after completing his Middle School education, he worked briefly as a supporting staff at Adiembra Methodist Day Care School. He subsequently sat for the GCE O Level Certificate Examination as a private candidate and passed.

Like most young men of his days, he had the dream to travel and so mobilised some funds as a newspaper vendor and travelled to Nigeria. He returned and joined the Evangel Assemblies of God Church and also worked at the Assemblies of God Literature Centre.

At a young age, Kobena developed a passion for writing and journalism that lasted his whole life. He was also much focused on pursuing education and believed that knowledge coupled with dedicated faith in Jesus Christ was the key to achieving all success in life. Consequently, in the early 90's he extended his education in the United States to receive a Bachelor of Arts at Evangel College in Springfield Missouri, a Masters, and ultimately a Doctorate degree in Ministry from Memphis Theological Seminary in 2015. He consistently pursued higher education while raising his 3 children.

Through the years he continued to sharpen his skills as a chaplain and theologian through additional certifications, which included becoming a Board-Certified Chaplain and Certified Pediatric Chaplain from Pediatric Chaplains Institute. He published several magazines, newsletters, and books as he navigated his career and parenthood. One of his career highlights while serving in most current role as a Chaplain at Le Bonhuer Childrens hospital in Memphis, was receiving the Power of One Award, a highly respected award in his profession for which he was very proud of. As a chaplain for the last 15 years, he was known for being compassionate, patient, caring as he supported families going through their most trying times. He was described by many as being an encourager with a calming presence.

His love for service of God began during the 1980's when he served as a church worker at the Evangel Assemblies of God Church in Accra under Pastor Dr. James Obeng who is currently the Chairman of Council of Evangel Church International. During this period, he published newsletters and magazines. The most notable one was the Evangel Herald. Once he relocated to the United States he served as a leader and minister in various Churches including Solid Rock Church in Springfield Missouri, First Assemblies of God in Memphis TN, North Star Community Church Memphis TN and most recently New Sardis Baptist Church in Memphis. In 2021 he achieved his lifelong goal of owning and pastoring in his own church building in Memphis. That is where the Cross Ministries Church International resided and grew over the years. His passion for Evangelism is the reason behind his over two decades preaching of the gospel around the United States, Africa and India. He also planted churches in Abuesi (2001), Abot (2006), Axim (2007), Cape Coast (2010), Yamoransa (2011), Eduma (2012), Mampuom (2013), Akokoanso (2015), and Dodowa (2016).


While planting churches, schools and orphanages he took the opportunity to educate other young pastors on how to become leaders in their own communities. He facilitated many pastoral training seminars over the years. He also led several mission trips with colleagues and fellow ministers from the United States to network with the various churches

he was connected to in Ghana. Currently there are several churches that are actively being supported by Cross Ministries International in Bungoma (Kenya), Dambai, Worawora, Dambai, and Matoka. His last act of Evangelism on his most recent visit to Ghana was in Mid-December 2023 where he held a crusade in Sekondi before his untimely passing at the 37 Military Hospital after a short illness.

Kobena's infectious joy and genuine kindness touched the lives of everyone he encountered. He was always willing to pray and encourage those going through difficult times as he could relate having navigated many challenges in his own personal life. His dedication to helping others extended beyond his personal and professional life, leaving a lasting impact on the people he touched. He leaves behind a legacy of compassion, resilience, and genuine love for people.

He is survived by a wife, three children- Rosesharon, Levi, Lois, and a Grandchild, Noah Eke.

The family will forever miss you. May your gentle soul rest in perfect peace.

You showed professionalism, kindness, trust, strict compliance in your everyday activities. The first thing you instilled in us so strongly was the fear of God. This is evident in our lives today. None of us takes our Gods commands lightly. We all love and serve him passionately in our various endeavors and calls.

We will always remember the smiles and the excitement in you when coming to visit each of us in the different states. You always celebrated all our accomplishments, graduations, life milestones, career wins and encouraged us to dream big audacious lives. Your death has really left us with a heartache no one can heal but we will hold onto this:

Throughout most of my life, he was the main parent I depended on, and I remember how he worked very hard, sometimes working two jobs, in order to take care of my siblings and I. As a father, he was a great role model to his children by encouraging us to work hard and to not expect people to give us opportunities easily. As intimidating as he could be at times, I will always appreciate the straight-forward disciplinarian he was because he pushed me to achieve my goals and helped me to live with realistic expectations.

I also remember how attached I was to him as a child and how I never wanted to be anywhere without him. When he would travel out of town, it was hard for me to be happy without him around and I usually cried until he returned; that's how much I looked up to him. I remember how devoted he was to serving others as a pastor, and donating to people in need was a very integral part of his ministry. I also remember how proud I was of him for opening The Cross Church back in 2019, and how glad I was to be there to help him with the ministry. My favorite times at the church was when he would host social gatherings where he would donate necessities and give Christmas presents to his church members and people in the community surrounding his church. The joy of giving was a passion I shared with him, and I'll forever cherish the memories we have together doing what we loved: serving others.

While I could write much more about him, I'll end this tribute by sharing a Bible verse that I think captures the legacy he leaves behind:


"I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race. I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me the crown of


Dr. Charm took the role of spiritual father very seriously and mentored many sons and daughters. His wisdom and guidance helped each one of us to walk in our calling.

Dr. Charm raised money for many schools, orphanages, and churches. At every opportunity, he gave to the poor, the widows and orphans. He also gave money to help families start businesses. He was loved by the students, teachers, administrators, and church leaders. Whenever he came on a visit, he was greeted with such love and affection. Children and adults would often run up to him and hug him. Dr. Charm was well-respected, and he also loved to tell stories and make people laugh.

During a visit to a small village on the coast, a man came up to Dr. Charm. They referred to him as a mad man because he was suffering from mental health issues. Dr. Charm prayed for the man, took him to the barber's shop and got his hair cut, bought him some new clothes, and gave him some money. The people in the community can attest to how the man's life was changed for the better. There are countless stories like this that describe how God used Dr. Charm to help people.

Dr. Charm was a blessed man, full of the Word of God. His focus was to preach the Word of God and to bring lost souls into the Kingdom. He won a lot of souls. We accompanied Dr. Charm on countless mission trips, church services, and crusades and we had a chance to see how he dealt with obstacles, frustrations, victories, praise, and criticism. He gave us responsibilities and took great pleasure in watching us learn and grow in the ministry.

Reverend Doctor Kobena Charm fell ill after a crusade in Sekondi-Takoradi. He was a great man of God who loved people and the gospel. We were blessed to have him in our lives to help guide us on our spiritual journeys and become preachers of the gospel of Jesus Christ. We pray that the Lord gives us the strength and wisdom to continue the things that he taught us. May his gentle soul rest in perfect peace.

We believe as a church that Rev. Dr. Charm has fulfilled the above scripture; therefore, THE ONE who gave him the assignment has deemed it fit to call him home at this time. This is our consolation to the bereaved family and children.

The seed of our relationship with Rev Charm was planted through Rev Kojo Asare of the Calvary Love Assemblies of God church in East Legon. Pastor's Charm's passion for church planting and the expansion of God's Kingdom made our relationship stronger.

In 2001, Rev Dr Charm came to Ghana with a missionary called Brandon Borne with a mandate from God to go to the western region of Ghana to spread God's word. He sought permission from Rev Asare so that Brother John Nkum Boateng now Revered Boateng will accompany them and this journey led to the establishing of the Abuesi church.

In Abuesi, we had a weeklong crusade where ninety-six (96) souls gave their lives to Christ, and they became the membership base of the Abuesi church. Every year, Rev Charm came from the United States of America with different missionaries who included Bishop Joe Childers, Pastor Bruce Pearson, Pastor Steve Abban Nartey and many more. Through his leadership, the Abuesi church gave birth to the Abort, Axim, Wassa Mampong, Yamoransa and Aduma branches.

Rev. Dr. Charm had a lot of concern for rural communities who were being cut-off from hearing the word of God and that fueled his passion to plant churches in such areas. He took a lot of interest in training many pastors and leaders. This gives us confidence and belief as a church that he has made a lot of impact on God's kingdom.

A week before his passing, he had a crusade with the Sekondi chapter of the Christian Council of Churches Ghana. Therefore, learning of his death after such a program was shocking and difficult to believe. On behalf of the entire membership of the church, we express our deepest condolences to the children and family. We pray for divine comfort.

Every morning at 9:45am, we have staff huddles. While this is the time, I share info from Daily Safety Briefing and other pertinent patient and clinical information, this is also our time as chaplains. This is our daily time for bonding and sharing. This is the space where we share and support each other in the same way we support and offer safe space to patients, families and our fellow Associates. In essence, this is how we have all come to get to know each other ... spiritually, professionally, theologically and personally.

So, it was not unusual when Kobe shared a story one morning about something that had occurred in his life years ago. I preface this with saying, if you only knew Kobe as Chaplain Kobe or Pastor Kobe, you probably have NO idea of what a character he really was! He prided himself on being a jokester and often shared stories of what a prankster he said he was growing up.

One morning he shared a story about being in a restaurant several years ago, and he talked about how much he enjoyed the food. He said it was so good that later the same day, he went back to the same restaurant. When the waitress recognized him from being there earlier, she questioned him. She said something to the effect of, what are you doing here again? Weren't you here earlier today? And in Kobe's direct tone his response was, "what's your business"?

In other words, mind your own business. If I want to eat here several times a day, what business is it of yours? What's your business!?!

From that point on, what's your business became our inside joke and our departmental reference point.

What's your business was the mantle Kobe carried. Not in a bad or cynical way. Not in a defensive way; but in a very professional regard. Typically, Kobe was very good at minding his own business ... he was very introverted and reserved. The same way he carried his role in ministry, and as a chaplain was how he lived his life, minding his business. He was deliberate, intentional, and focused on ministry. It was integrated into his life, and he took it very seriously. In fact, there were times we would be laughing and joking, and Kobe would abruptly dismiss himself to get back to work ... most often without saying a word, but quietly assuming the tasks at hand.

However, as many of you can attest, Kobe was also very good at being mindful of you, your business ... mindful, but not nosey. He was concerned and caring.

Kobe was known for walking the halls of the hospital. He would intentionally round the floors, even units he didn't cover because it was his business to care about Le Bonheur... the patients, the families, and the staff.

He truly embodied the ministry of presence, and his presence also was often very calming to those in crisis. His presence alone, often without saying a word, provided comfort to countless families over the years. Kobe truly carried the core values of Methodist Le Bonheur Healthcare and the core competencies of chaplaincy in his heart and mind at all times.

When I think of Kobe and what's your business, I think of how he showed compassion and care. Whenever he

encountered people ... anybody, anywhere as he rounded and walked the halls, Kobe made it his business to ask about your business ... How is your family? How are the twins? He knew and remembered specifics about everybody, by name and he always made it a point to stop and pray at the moment of the encounter.

I parallel Kobe to the good Samaritan. The halls of Le bonheur were his street. While many others ignored people they met on the elevator with them, and walked right pass people in crisis or distress, Kobe made it a point to stop and minister to them. While others were too consumed and distracted as they moved through the hallways, Kobe stopped, not only to ask what they needed, but to provide safe space for them, to offer empathic listening and to provide the truly needed pastoral care.

Kobe lived knowing that it's not about knowing who your neighbour is. It's more important to show yourself neighbourly and kind. It's more important to show merch and do justice.

Kobe truly loved the lord with all his heart, mind and soul and the fruit of his labour showed evidence of such. Many may not have understood why Kobe moved through the halls of this institution as he did, but it was his business.

Kobe took to heart what it meant to function as an agent of God. It was a divine action and the work he did was divine. He imitated the compassion of God in all he did.

The Spirit of the Lord was on Kobe, and he made that his business. It was his business to bring hope to the hopeless, to shine light in darkness, it was his business to heal broken hearts. It was his business to offer comfort to those experiencing trauma and crisis, it was his business!

Kobe left us a legacy of compassion. He made God's business his business. He made the ministry of Jesus, his business. Jews, Gentiles, Samaritans, Memphians, Ghanaians, it was his business.

Make it your business, that at the end of your journey, God opens the windows of heaven and says to you, well done my good and faithful servant, your living has not been in vain. You will be missed Kobe.
